

President's Corner

Sean (K4KBK)

Guide to have gone and survived but glad to have returned from the Heritage Tour 2024 in England, Scotland and Ireland. Great trip! Logged about 1800 accident-free driving miles on the wrong side of the road, a thousand rail miles and a maritime excursion into the North Atlantic between the Cliffs of Moher and the Aran Islands in 12–14-foot seas, a very sporting ride!

I did take an ID52 to use as I traveled about but that whole ham environment in Europe was much different from the US market. I was informed by the Royal Radio Society of the UK while in Dayton, that the predominant digital radio type in use in the UK was DSTAR but what I found was that the Ham market in the UK is nearly evenly split between DStar and DMR for digital radio, so only taking a DStar radio left me somewhat lacking.

The repeater systems in Europe are also very intriguing. Many are set up as multi-function repeaters, meaning that they can be used simultaneously for FM, DMR, DStar and System Fusion all on the one pair of channels. As explained to me by the MB6FU repeater admin up in Nairn Scotland, there is a smart receiver on the front end of the repeater that listens for the data format of received signals and directs the transmission internally to the proper stack; FM, DM, DStar or Sys Fusion. I thought that was a clever approach to managing multiple transmission types from a single location and single channel pair although I expect there could be a downside related to throughput, bandwidth throttling, etc., but the concept is fascinating nonetheless. What was even more bizarre was that I was listening to conversations that were running as DMR while I was setup on the same repeater but on a DStar channel. I couldn't transmit to them but I could hear just fine! Probably the biggest challenge to learning all of this was that I was wrapped into a conversation on an HT, talking with a guy with a very pronounced Scottish brogue. My ears were working triple overtime! Yikes!

I also discovered an interesting twist in DStar in the UK and that is the use of DSC reflectors. While we use the older type REF reflectors to link DSTAR across the internet here, Europe can use both types but predominantly use DSC reflectors. REF and DSC are two of the four reflector types in use globally for DStar (REF, XRF, DCS & XLX). As my ID52 is set up for the US market, it has preformatted commands to link, unlink, and interrogate the REF reflectors. I

later found out that the syntax to perform the same actions on the DSC reflectors is exactly the same as the REF reflectors, e.g., DCS062BL vice REF062BL. As I couldn't figure out the REF / DSC dilemma on the ID52, my new friend from MB6FU offered to set up REF062B so that I could connect with some of our club members who were also connected to the reflector. I made a couple of QSTs and our own Vice President roger'd up, clear as a bell, operating through his hotspot. We had a 40 min conversation and signed off. It was awesome!

Regarding CEPT, the European Conference on Postal and Telecommunications Administrations, which defines the European operating environment for foreign radio operators, the UK was simple and free for use providing you were carrying a copy of the CEPT agreement, a government photo id and that you would use M/Callsign for England and MM/Callsign for Scotland. Ireland was another matter. The Emerald Isle needed a pre-registration in advance of your visit along with 30 Euro and then you could use that returned approval document along with EI/Callsign to make amateur radio calls.

While it wasn't a contact-rich radio trip, I did learn a lot of valuable lessons which I will apply on my next trip. I will add DMR to my kit and take a small HF POTA setup. One lesson here was that if you are roaming the countryside on your UK/Ireland trips, the existence of nearby repeaters is almost nil so switching to HF setup is your best option if you want to communicate.

Comments / Questions always welcomed.

ARES Joe Kalfa, KD2HGZ

H opefully you all are safe after the recent hurricane and from the incoming one. We wanted to take a minute to highlight what ARES is and what it can do for you. ARES is a program organized by the ARRL for amateur radio operators to be able to assist in emergency situations. Below is a brief summary of the most recent ARES-type activity related to natural disasters.



While there are a lot of lessons learned already from Hurricane Helene, I would like to highlight the efforts of K2DMG (not a club member), who basically ran a full dispatch center off a 2m FM repeater on Mount Mitchell, NC. As early as Friday, the net started with ham radio communicators checking in and giving reports on missing persons and conditions, and evolved into allowing aid workers and the fire department to coordinate HLZs and supply drops to areas completely cut off. This net was broadcast to the world for several days on Broadcastify. I am working to obtain audio highlights of their efforts on some key points that have come out of this so far.

Baofengs are in a lot more places than we realize and when a disaster strikes, many people will be breaking them out.

GMRS and FRS radios are going to be critical for communicating with a lot of people in need. I know we like to focus on ham radio, and ARES is a ham radio focused group, but we need to remember there are other technologies out there.

Ham radios were being handed out to relief workers and public safety teams as the VIPER (state-wide public safety radio system) had failed in many areas. (Source: this has been reported on the repeater traffic and I have seen social media posts. I have not seen any official press release notes or reporting to confirm this).

Refresh yourself on the Incident Command System, this system should be in play in every municipality experiencing disaster. If you plan to be involved in any capacity with ARES or another group who has the potential to respond to a disaster, knowing how to interoperate will be critical to everyone's success.

- 1. 19 members were present at the meeting location of the Alexandria City Police Department at 3600 Wheeler Avenue with 2 members participating in the online Zoom meeting.
- 2. The treasurer reported a total balance of \$13,433.61 in club accounts with a total of 78 paid members including 2 membership renewals. A re-occurring cellular bill is paid to ATT every month for \$46.91. Field Day food and supply expenses still have not been paid.
- 3. **Bob Crumley**, KO4ZIK, discussed new methods of recruiting additional members such as radio nets focused on the topics of ARES or JS8.
- 4. **Jack York**, KE7VOU, summarized the secretary's report for the August 9th meeting.
- 5. **Mike Aimone**, WA8AHZ, gave a presentation on volunteering for the Marine Corp Marathon on October 27th in Arlington County, Virginia. A radio test day is scheduled for October 14th and a training day will occur on October 19th at the Armed Forces Retirement Home in DC.
- 6. **Mike Aimone**, WA8AHZ, also gave a presentation on radio station grounding and bonding.
- 7. Committee reports started with **Ian Keith**, N8IK, reporting that all repeaters are functioning. Ian recommended that the club begin planning to move the repeaters to the new hospital location. **Richard Morani**, KW4UJ, reported that the fall license classes will begin on October 1st with electronic exams being held on December 3rd. Richard also reported no problems with the website. KB2LRX, **Jan Maas**, PIO, published the latest version of Arc-Shorts on the club website earlier in the week. The club will have an information table at the Alexandria City Preparedness

Fair on September 20th. The Arlington Amateur Radio Club has invited the club to participate in The Boy Scouts of America Jamboree on the Air Event to be held on Saturday, October 19th, from 8 am to 2 pm at Columbia Island Marina in the Lady Bird Johnson Park next to the southbound George Washington Parkway.
